


· Break the ice

- To find ways to communicate across different languages.
 - Ex.: "Using hand gestures helped them bridge the language gap in their international meeting."

Ex.: "I know the answer, it's on the tip of my tongue!"





• Speak volumes

 When something reveals a lot without needing words.


Ex.: "Her confident speech spoke volumes about her language skills."



• Fine-tune pronunciation

 To make small adjustments to how you pronounce words.

Ex.: "He fine-tuned his pronunciation of 'r' and now sounds more like a native speaker."



Immersion

Immersion involves surrounding yourself with the target language, either by living in a foreign country or immersing yourself in language activities.



• Polyglot

A polyglot is someone who can speak multiple languages fluently.

Ex.: My friend Sarah is a true polyglot; she can effortlessly switch between five different languages in a single conversation.





An accent is the way in which a person or group of people pronounce words and sounds, often influenced by their regional or cultural background.

Ex.: Maria's French accent was so charming that it added a delightful touch to her English when she spoke.

• Dialect

A dialect is a distinct variety or form of a language that is spoken by a particular group of people or in a specific region. It often includes unique vocabulary, pronunciation, and grammar features.

Ex.: The Scottish dialect, known as Scots, has its own set of words and expressions that differ from standard English, making it easily recognizable as a unique form of language.


• Accent Reduction

Accent reduction techniques help learners speak a language more clearly and with a neutral accent.



• First language

A first language, also known as a native language or mother tongue, is the language a person learns from birth or early childhood. It is typically the language spoken in the person's family and immediate environment.

Ex.: English was my first language because I grew up in an English-speaking household in the United States.

• Heritage langauge



A heritage language refers to a language that is part of an individual's cultural heritage or background but may not have been their first language. It is often a language spoken by their ancestors or within their ethnic or cultural community.

Ex.: While my first language is English, my heritage language is Arabic, as my family hails from Iraq, and we maintain Arabic traditions and customs.

• Flashcards

Flashcards are handy tools for language learners. They typically contain a word or phrase on one side and its translation or definition on the other.

 Ex.: I use flashcards to memorize new vocabulary; it's a fun and effective way to learn.
