What is linguistics?

Defining Linguistics

- Linguistics can be defined as "the scientific study of language, a discipline which describes language in all its aspects and formulates theories as to how it works".
- By scientific we mean that linguistics is objective and systematic.
- Linguistics is descriptive (not prescriptive), it only describes language as it is and doesn't put rules for people to follow in using language

 Linguistics is interested in providing answers for different interesting questions about languages, such as "what is language?" and "how does language work?"

What is a linguist?

- A linguist is a person specialized in linguistics.
- A linguist describes languages, but does not prescribe (dictate) how to use them.
- If a linguist proposes a theory (for example a theory of language acquisition) he has to provide a tangible practical evidence as to <u>describe</u> how language is really acquired by children.

Linguistics is a discipline that covers a wide range of topics. The below figure shows the scope of linguistics:
